Billet life... what's it all about?

What Is Billeting in Hockey?

Junior hockey players typically have to leave home to play for their hockey teams. Players are typically 16-21 years of age, which means they'll need a place to stay during the hockey season (and typically are unable to rent their own place).

Billet families will take players into their homes to become part of their family during the hockey season. They are host families who provide a home and support to young men as they pursue their hockey career.

Do Billet Families Get Paid?

Yes, billet families get paid.

They typically receive a stipend of \$300 per month. The fee is paid directly to the billet family. This payment isn't necessarily seen as a way to earn a substantial income, but as a way to help with additional household expenses from the player—like food.

How Do You Become a Hockey Billet Family?

Becoming a billet family is as simple as reaching out to the team and applying to become a billet. Potential billet families will have to fill out an application and have a background check before being accepted. The home will be checked out by the billet coordinator, to make sure it meets the needs of the player.

Billet families are also required to complete their certification with the national SafeSport program.

Can a Billet Family Host More Than One Player?

Yes, billet families can host more than one player.

While most billet families will take in one hockey player, teams typically allow up to two players per family. This helps players share transportation and food expenses. Plus, it's a great way for players to provide company for one another. The main requirement is that each player has enough space in their living arrangements at the billet's home. Each player should have their own bed, dresser or closet, and easy access to a restroom.

How Long Do Players Stay With Billet Families?

Players usually arrive with their billet families in mid- to late August. This date is dependent on the hockey preseason practice schedule.

Host families need to commit to the entire season, from August to the end of the hockey season. Depending on how far the team makes it into the playoff season, most players will leave within a few days of the end of the season, which is generally late March.

The players will go home for a brief break over Christmas, but do not go home for Thanksgiving.

What Does a Billet Family Provide?

Billet families are required to provide a few different things for their hockey player:

Room

A billet family is required to provide a private bedroom for their player. In the event that a family hosts 2 players, if there is an appropriate space, players may share a room.

Players shouldn't be placed in a room with younger members of the billet family.

Typically, you're required to provide a bed, closet or dresser, and easy access to a restroom.

Billet host families should also provide access to the internet for the player.

Meals

Along with a room to stay in, billet families are also required to provide food for the player.

Billets are required to provide access to 3 basic meals per day to the player (this is generally having options available for breakfast and lunch and a cooked meal for dinner). Snacks are usually also expected.

Transportation

Players are typically expected to provide their own transportation within reason. If a player does not have their own transportation, they will generally be placed in a home where the other player can provide transportation.
